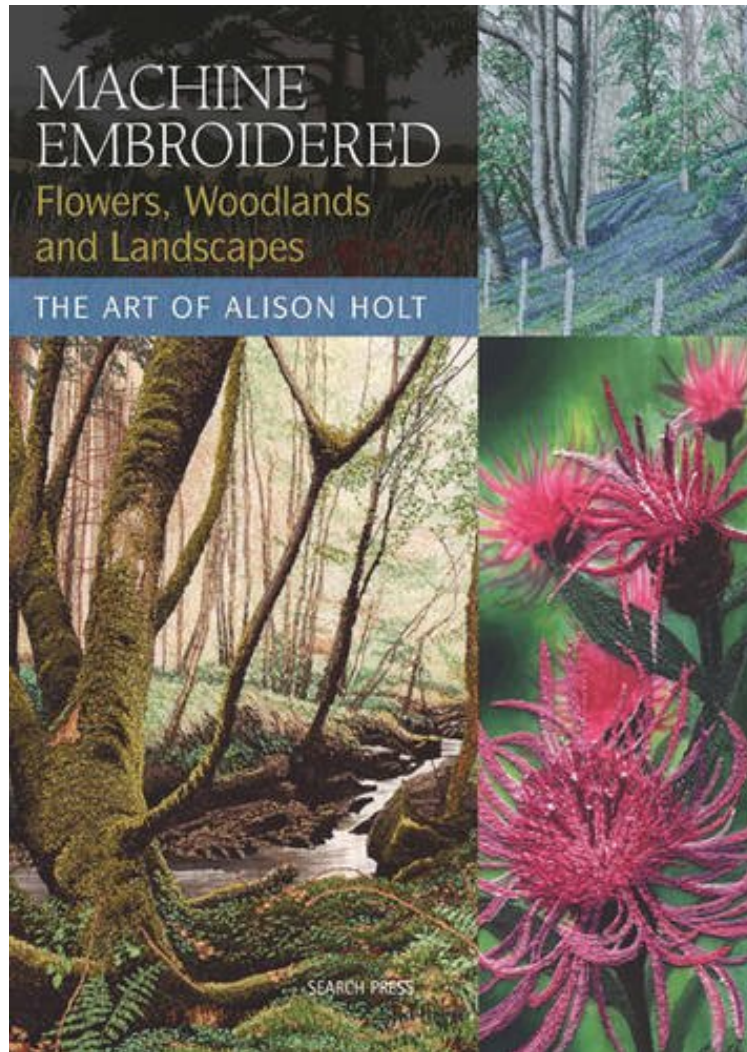

By SLS Alison Holt is new to me and I am simply beside myself with the glee that comes from discovering a rare artist and her stunning creations. But if you are already an Alison Holt fan and own her previous books, you may very well have seen much of the material that is presented in this new compendium. Technically

speaking - and quoting from the publication page - this book is "based on" these 3 books: 1. Beginner's Guide To Machine Embroidered Landscapes 2. Beginner's Guide to Machine Embroidered Flowers 3. Machine Embroidered Woodlands There is some reformatting of text, but many of the photos are identical to those previously published. (I used 's Search Inside function, since I do not own any of the earlier books; my "research" on this is not exhaustive by any means!). So please take note of this so that you are not disappointed. Now on to the gushing and oohing and ahing ... Ms. Holt paints her inspirations on silk, then uses mostly straight and zig-zag stitching to build up the texture and detail, with feed dogs dropped and presser foot removed. Her favorite thread is fine (no 50) cotton. She does alter the screw on the bobbin, so if you are very particular about doing this, you might want to invest in a separate bobbin (keeping the other in its pristine unaltered condition). She also uses silk paints as instrumental portions of the background, using a hot iron to fix the colors. She provides excellent verbal instructions and detailed photos for every step of this intricate process; she is also the model in every photograph. I have trouble formatting even a complete sentence when trying to describe the results here: staggeringly beautiful, sublime, richly textured, supra-realistic, drop-dead dioramas. To call this "thread painting" simply does not convey the sheer artistry Ms. Holt portrays. She raises the machine embroidery bar for thread artists everywhere. There seems to be a trend in crafts publishing to reissue previously published books into re-editions. I am not critical of this, per se, but I do wish authors and publishers would be up front or simply focus on new content only. I have read many reviews by faithful fans and crafters who were sadly disappointed to spend good money on these re-editions, only to learn they already own the same material in a different format. 1 of 1 people found the following review helpful.
